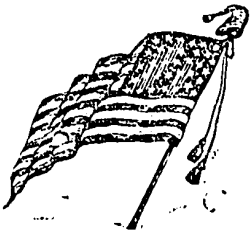

THE MINES.

Upon this subject the Transcript of
yesterday furnishes some very sensible
remarks. The uncertainty of being
able to successfully contend against
litigation is working serious harm not
only to Grass Valley but to the county
at large. Our township abounds in
ledges, whose value have only to be
tested to be fully developed. There
are large numbers ready and willing
to go to work in prospecting and work-

ing mining grounds in this vicinity.
But a fear of throwing their labor
away retards their progress; because
no sooner is a ledge of any value cut,
but a dozen different claimants spring
up to take possession and drive the
honest miner from his hard-earned
prize. This is a subject to which we
shall advert in the future, while we
will content ourself at present with
quoting a portion of the Transcript's
remarks:
Cases without number might be
cited where old titles have been resur-

rected to frighten enterprising miners
from valuable ledges. Some provision
should be made to provide against this
state of things. The quartz mining
laws of this county should be strictly
enforced and men should be compelled
to obey them in order to hold quartz
claims. If they are not sufficient,
amendments should be made. Some-
thing should be done to open the
ledges in the county to those who are
willing to develop them and to protect
them against the old claimants. The
holder of every claim should be made
to record his intention when he sus-
pends operations upon a claim, if he
desires to hold it, and every man
bringing suit for the possession of a
claim should be compelled to give secu-
rity, so that if he fails to establish
his title those working the mine may
sustain no loss. It is the interest of
every man in the community that the
mines should be opened and it makes
no difference what company does the
work, so 'tis done. Every claim, as
soon as abandoned should be open to
the prospector who goes to work in
good faith for the purpose of develop-
ing a mine. If some rule is establish-
ed which will protect the prospector
in his work while it does not oppress
the miner who holds a claim with the
intention of working it, a great obsta-
cle to the development of the mineral
wealth of the county will be removed.

OUR SAN FRANCISCO LETTER.

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 15, 1865.
EXCHANGE DEBATE.

For a few days past the columns of our
dailies have been to quite a degree devoted
to articles for and against an idea which
seems to have had an almost spontaneous
origin, and that is, a proposition to build a new
"Merchants' Exchange." Some persons hav-

ing the power of presence are led to believe
that they see in their "mind's eye" that the
commerce on this coast will increase to such
an extent that the present Chamber of Com-
merce will be found inadequate to the require-
ments necessary to carry on business and
promote the commercial interests of Califor-
nia. Therefore it was proposed to organize
a new "chamber" procure a large centrally-
located and substantial building, to be fitted
up in first-class style, with telegraph to con-
nect with all parts of the States—and sove
the world over—and all the modern improve-
ments. The old Exchange Building, corner
of Battery and Washington streets, was
spoken of, at the price of \$75,000, which, con-
sidering that it cost \$30,000, would be cheap,
and if this building is purchased and turned
into a Temple of Trade it will be an edifice
worthy of the enterprise.

However, this is not all. Whatever is un-
dertaken "pro bono publico," growers are
always around who must have their say in
everything; so it is with this, an nation-
Exchange party sprang up, who thought they
saw schemers behind the scenes trying to
make a good thing of this new enterprise;
thereupon they got up a memorial which was
signed by the leading merchants, who de-
clared themselves perfectly contented with
the manner in which affairs were conducted
at present, and saw no absolute necessity for
a change. This led to quite a controversy
between the two parties, and as matters
stand, all seems to be at a dead lock, while
the owner of the "big building," like Micaw-
ber, is "waiting for something to turn up."

nic's Fair. Two furniture dealers advertise,

LOCAL MATTERS.

PRESS AND FEATHERS.—Our usually quiet town (this form of expression will at once strike the reader as being particularly novel) has recently been thrown into intense excitement, by the killing of a chicken, or to be more explicit, a blue hen, and the larceny of the same, which killing and felonious appropriation of the bird was alleged to have been committed on Scudder Flat, on Monday last.

THE PROSECUTING WITNESS.—The prosecuting witness, Mr. Michael, (not he of the Mill street cigar emporium) made out a pretty strong case against one of the parties under arrest, who was seen in the vicinity of M.'s house, gun in hand, a moment after the report of his rowling piece was heard, (on this point, by the way, witness was not very clear) and he was seen running in the direction of the wounded and fluttering hen. The accused then grabbed the dying bird, and ran at the top of his speed, followed by Mr. Michael, whose running evidently was equal to that made by the famous Gilpin, 'Tam O'Shanter, John Caldwell in the recent race in this county for the District Attorneyship, or "Kentucky" at the late races at Saratoga.

FOUND DEAD.—Wm. Russell, aged thirty-five years, who has been engaged in mining on Slato Creek, was found dead yesterday morning on the creek. On Friday Russell left his work for the purpose of going to Norton, staying at the same time that he would not be absent more than an hour or two. He did not return and nothing was heard of him until yesterday morning, when his dead body was discovered in the creek, between Norton and the shaft at which he was at work.

TARGET EXERCISES.—The Grass Valley Union Guard, under command of First Lieut. Days, went out to the vicinity of the Halfway House, on the Nevada road yesterday morning, for target shooting. The company turned out some twenty-two muskets on this occasion, and after firing in their array on Mill street, marched out to the spot selected for the target shooting. They shot at a distance of two hundred yards, and the appearance of the target fully demonstrates the fact of there being some "shootists" among the Guard.
